Dear North Beach Residents,

Do you ever remember a spring arriving as late as this year? What a welcome relief from the cold, wet days of a winter that seemed to drag on forever!

Much of the work on the pier was started and finished, including all the pile-driving, and stone revetment placed in front of the pier T-section. We're waiting for you at the beach! Many residents don't know that if you live within the "incorporated" town limits of the Town of North Beach (not the zip code zone) you have free access to the beach and the fishing deck. You and your guests are entitled to a free visit to enjoy the beach areas and to go fishing. In order to take advantage of this free amenity you will need to bring your current identification to the Town Hall to obtain a seasonal pass (this year, ALL RESIDENTS are up for renewal) or present your identification at the Welcome Center for a day pass. Your guests, who will be free, must be with you at the time of check in at the Welcome Center. Why not take advantage of this special "town perk" while you can. The Town Attendants are waiting to serve you. This is your Town! Town staff has added additional weekend hours to allow you to obtain beach passes and parking decals. The dates are as follows:

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS (DPW) UPDATE

DPW would like to take this time to update residents on a few exciting projects that will hopefully be completed in the very near future.

Work is continuing on the town pier, the contractor is finishing the decking on the t-section of the pier, and has framing and decking on the 10 foot extension to complete. All railing and beach clean up has to be completed. Work is expected to start soon on the railing and bench installation. There is still a great deal of work to be completed in order for the pier to be open for Memorial Day weekend and it will take a great deal of effort from all parties to achieve this goal.

Work continues at the North Beach Park and Sculpture Garden. The pond contractor is 90% complete with the pond installation and has a punch list to complete. Pond plantings also have to be installed and we are looking at adding a

fountain to the large pond (picture on the right). Site work has started with the installation of storm water pipe, bio retention pond, and electric conduits. The



installation of the water line and irrigation system has also been started. Sidewalks have been staked out and the prep work is underway for construction. Benches and lighting for the park have been ordered as these are long lead time items. The tree portion of the landscaping has been put out to bid and bids are due May 1, 2015. You can expect a lot to happen in the next 30 days to make the site look like a park.

DPW and the Town Engineer anticipate a pre-construction meeting with Environmental Concerns, Inc. regarding the living shore line and berm early May. See page 5 for more details.

Recently, DPW completed the upgrade of the Bay Avenue sewer pumping station. The station is now equipped with two new three phase power submersible pumps, which are more efficient and easier to maintain. New piping replaced the old station piping that was originally installed in the early 1950's. The station is now also equipped with a diesel backup pump that can handle the daily flow in case of emergencies. This pump can also operate in normal conditions if needed. Most of the work for this upgrade was done in house, with the help of a few local contractors. This resulted in a significant cost savings for the town.

The town now has a completed Emergency Response Plan for the water system thanks to the help of Ms. Ginny Siemer, with the Maryland Rural Water Association. This was a request from our water compliance inspector from MDE and is intended to be a hands-on guide for staff to follow in the event emergency situations may arise related to the public water system.

CRAPE MYRTLE TRIMMING

You may have noticed the crape myrtle trees along the boardwalk have been trimmed back. We wanted to give you some history on this type of pruning - called pollarding. Town resident, Bill Poole, started pollarding the crape myrtles along Bay Avenue in 2006. The reasons for pollarding the crape myrtles are to keep the height in balance to the size of the flower beds, minimize the root growth to protect the sprinkler system and allow for the perfect size tree to decorate with holiday lights during the winter season.

Pollarding is an option to adopt a pruning regime which maintains a tree at a given height permanently. Optimally, this is done with young trees — three years after planting or so — once the desired plant structure and height has been attained. At that point, the tree is topped. In a pollarded tree, all the sprouts of the previous year are removed to their base each winter. This permits the tree to develop "knobbly" structures called pollard heads, which



form natural defenses against wound decay.

Pollarding is a common technique applied to street trees in Europe as a way to keep their top growth in check. One of the most conspicuous displays of pollarded Natchez crape myrtles is at the National Gallery of Art's Sculpture Garden on the Mall. Here, more than 20 have been pollarded every winter to reduce the canopy. The pollard heads are now the size of softballs, or larger.

DOGS RUNNING AT LARGE

Please be reminded that Article II Dogs, Section 26-3 of the code of the Town of North Beach states that no person shall own or harbor within the Town of North Beach any dog unless such dog is licensed as provided by the ordinances and regulations of Calvert County. All ordinances and regulations of Calvert County concerning dogs shall apply within the corporate limits of the Town of North Beach. In addition, this includes the provisions of the Calvert County Code which call for all dogs to be on a leash when in the company of their owner outside the confines of the owner's property. In addition, it is expressly prohibited for any dog to be on the town beach, whether said dog be at large or on a leash. It is the intention of the Council that dogs are prohibited on the sand beach under all circumstances.

Additionally, Section 26-7, Enforcement, states that the Mayor, Town Code Enforcement Officer, Deputies of the Calvert County Sheriff's Department, and Dog Wardens of Calvert County shall have jurisdiction within the corporate limits of North Beach to enforce all provisions of this article. Section 26-8, Violations and penalties states that violations of this article shall be a municipal infraction.

LIVING SHORELINE PROJECT UPDATE

In April, the town finally received permits to begin the construction of the living shoreline along the water's edge at the town's Walton Beach Nature Preserve. The property is located on the east side of Bay Avenue, south of the Anne Arundel County line. The living shoreline not only protects 700 feet of rapidly eroding shoreline, it will create over an acre of new tidal wetlands and vastly improve the surrounding tidal marsh between the living shoreline and Bay Avenue (Maryland Route 261).

The living shoreline is being constructed under a \$629,514 contract the town has with Environmental Concerns, Inc. of St. Michaels, Maryland. The project is being partially funded with a \$540,000 grant from the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Foundation. With construction starting during the month of May, the work will continue through the summer months and completed by fall.



SEE YOU AT THE BEACH!

Friday evenings in North Beach, starting May I, is definitely the place to be for the Farmers' Market, Art Fair and Classic Car Cruise-In. The popular market is sure to bring everyone out of their winter blues and into a night filled with the smell of

Kettle Corn, french fries, baked goods, fresh fruits and veggies and the warm summer breezes from the Chesapeake Bay. Returning to the market are the popular vendors, such as Calvert Kettle Corn, Swann's Farm, Cox Farm, Barbie's Breads and DC Dills, just to name a few. The Art Fair brings new artists with their creations to town. The Classic Car Cruise is always popular with car enthusiasts. It will be nice to see the shiny cars and what new and improved things have been done to them over the winter. The campfires have been revamped to include a campfire and craft night twice a month on the beach. Last, but not least, a big thank you goes out to Crow Entertainment who will be providing music every Friday night this market season. So, make sure you mark your calendars and come down to the waterfront on Friday nights from May I through October 16, 2015.

Prevent Thefts

FROM VEHICLES

The Calvert County Sheriff's Office would like to again remind citizens to lock your car doors and remove any valuables whenever you park your vehicle. It takes very little time for a thief to enter an unlocked vehicle and relieve the owner of their hard earned property. If it isn't practical to remove the valuables, please ensure that they are locked in the trunk or hidden from view. Medications and cash should never be left unattended inside your vehicle. A vast majority of the theft from vehicle complaints the sheriff's office receives are from unlocked vehicles. Don't make yourself an easy target.

FLOOD DIKE UPDATE

At the same time the town receives the final permits for the Living Shoreline Project (see page 5), it will be approved to begin construction for the flood dike in the area north of 9th Street between Bay & Atlantic Avenues. The project is being constructed under a \$194,634 contract with Environmental Concerns. Inc. from St. Michaels, Maryland who is also the town's contractor for the Living Shoreline Project. The flood dike, which is designed to reduce routine tidal flooding of the 9th Street area, is scheduled to be completed by the end of the summer months.

SCOOP THE POOP

Help stop pointless poo-llution!

When you fail to pick up after your pooch, you may be doing more than upsetting the many residents and visitors to our Town. A quick rain shower is all it takes to transfer dog droppings from the ground and into the Chesapeake Bay.

We've added more mutt-mitt stations for easy access in five convenient locations. One station is at the corner of 9th and Atlantic, two stations at Overlook Park and two stations at the entrances to Callis Park. This brings our count to 14 mutt-mitt stations along the waterfront, at Overlook Park and locations used by pet owners throughout the Town.

SOLAR PANEL PROJECT AT THE DPW BUILDING

The town has received a \$37,500 grant from the State of Maryland Energy Authority to provide for the installation of solar panels on a town building. The town and solar panel firms looked at the best place to make the installation on a town building and selected the Department of Public Works (DPW) building because of its location, orientation and amount of roof area.

In February, the town received proposals for the solar panel project and has selected the firm, Solar Tech., Inc from Hollywood, Maryland for the project.

The DPW shop uses 32,400 kW/hours of electricity per year. The solar panel project will produce about 18,500 kW/hours of energy per year. This reduces the amount of electricity the town purchases for the DPW shop building by 43%, which reduces the annual electric bill from approximately \$4,200 to \$2,400. The Solar panel installation is scheduled to start in May and be completed by mid summer.

FLOOD INSURANCE CHANGES

On April 15, 2015 FEMA made changes to the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) as a result of the Home Owner Flood Insurance Affordability Act, which limited premium increases for individual premiums to 18% amongst other changes to the NFIP rate structure and program. A summary of the April 1, 2015 NFIP program changes can be obtained from Town Hall or insurance agents handling flood insurance policies.

CODE ENFORCEMENT

The goal of Code Enforcement is to help you protect the value of your property and improve the appearance of the town. This is done by making residents aware of issues that do not comply with the Town Codes and Ordinances. With the cooperation of town residents, we can move forward with our goal of making North Beach a great town in which to live and visit. It is not the intent to write violations or civil citations, but it is important that the codes be enforced; enforcing the codes benefits all of the citizens, employees, and visitors to our town. Did you know that the average American produces 1,600 pounds of trash each year? A lot of this trash includes items such as plastic, glass, paper and other items that can be recycled.

Why is recycling important? Most of us don't think too much about where our trash goes after it's hauled away from our homes. The trash we place curbside each week ends up in landfills that can negatively impact the environment. Did you know the more we recycle as a town the more money we save on trash collection fees? This impacts all of us. So, let's recycle and save money!

If you need one of the large blue recycling bins just call Town Hall and it will be delivered right to your door. Remember, recycling is EVERY Wednesday! The increase to weekly pick -up was based on resident feedback on a survey created by the North Beach Environmental Committee! The town has purchased a total of 500 recycling bins and has now disseminated 384 blue bins.

Do you know what items are recyclable? Glass, metal, plastic, paper and cardboard. More importantly, do you know what items are NOT recyclable?

HURRICANE SEASON

The 2015 hurricane season begins June I in the Atlantic Ocean. The United States typically experiences about 6 hurricanes and I2 named storms each year.

Tropical storms are named when wind speeds reach 39 miles per hour. Storm systems achieve hurricane status when winds reach 74 mph or greater. To play it safe, prepare now for hurricane season

- . Gather an adequate supply of bottled water and store it in a safe place.
- . Determine your vulnerability to a hurricane and how prone you may be
