MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Dear Neighbors,

The event and festival season is now in full swing! North Beach had a successful beach opening season over the Memorial Day weekend as the weather cooperated beautifully! That same weekend, I hope some of you were able to attend the Stars and Stripes Festival in Chesapeake Beach where, on Memorial Day, a new memorial honoring Vietnam veterans was dedicated in their Veteran's Memorial Park. What a wonderful and fitting tribute to the many Vietnam veterans who did not receive the "welcome home" they richly deserved at the time!

The weather, once again, was beautiful for the fourth annual "Eat, Drink, Go Local" festival sponsored by the Maryland Wineries Association. The many attendees enjoyed the best of Maryland wines, great local food and music by "The Voice" competitor Austin Ellis (who claims North Beach as his home) and the John Luskey band, a very popular local favorite.

At the time I am preparing this message, the End Hunger Dragon Boat Festival is just a few days away. The number of sponsored entrants in the race has doubled since last year and once again Channel 7 meteorologist Doug Hill will emcee the day-long event. I certainly hope you will be able to be either a spectator on June 21st or maybe even a competitor! Team North Beach will have to compete against Team Chesapeake Beach, once again, for rights to the highly-prized "Mayor's Cup". This trophy was won by North Beach last year and presently is on display in the Town Hall.

In addition to the regular events schedule, which is included in this newsletter, be sure to visit the Bayside History Museum at the intersection of 4th and Dayton or attend the very enjoyable productions of the Twin Beach Players performed regularly at the Boys and Girls Club building.

As far as capital improvements in town, a serious stormwater problem between 8th and 9th Streets and Chesapeake and Bay Avenues is presently being corrected by the efforts of our excellent public works director, Donnie Bowen, and his staff.

Also, in the near future, sidewalk and curbing will be constructed on Dayton Avenue between 3rd and 5th Streets. This will assist not only in correcting stormwater and erosion problems, but also increase parking spaces and make for safer pedestrian travel. I am pleased to report that the town has recently been notified of a \$540,000.00 grant award from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation. These monies will fund the construction of a living shoreline and wetlands restoration project on the Walton Preserve.

The town council recently acted to raise the beach fees for out-of-county visitors from \$12.00 to \$15.00 and for Calvert County guests from \$5.00 to \$6.00. The additional monies collected will be used to reimburse the town for costs associated with the recent Welcome Center expansion and the pier improvements which will begin in the fall.

We are also now investigating the possibility of creating a Wi-Fi hot spot on the waterfront; more on this to come later.

NEW FLOOD MAPS DUE NOVEMBER 2014

The Town has been notified by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) that they have revised the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) for the town and that this map will become effective on November 19, 2014. Prior to November 19th, the town is required to pass a new Flood Management Ordinance that will include the new FIRM. Properties in the tidal flood zone will not see any significant changes because of the new Flood Management Ordinance and FIRM. Some properties along the bay front will see their category change from the high hazard "V" zone to the tidal flooding "AE" zone which should help lower the their flood insurance cost. In the fall, the Town will be conducting public hearings and informational meetings to explain the changes to the National Flood Insurance program in the Town.

BEACH TIPS FROM TOWN ATTENDANTS

Jellyfish Stings: Use baking soda, meat tenderizer, rubbing alcohol or hand sanitizer. These home remedies may not work for everyone but they will reduce the irritation for a jellyfish sting.

Sunblock/Sunscreen: If you forget your sunblock or sunscreen ask the Welcome Center attendant where you can purchase some locally.

Showers: The showers are for rinsing only. Make sure all children are fully clothed when using the showers. Also, please no soaps, shampoos or bathing products while in the showers – these are rinsed directly into the bay. Help us protect our bay!

Sand Throwing: Please discourage your children from throwing sand while enjoying the beach.

Feeding the Ducks and Birds: Please do not feed the ducks or the birds. Any food left behind creates a rodent problem.

WELCOME RESIDENTS!

We're waiting for you at the beach! Most residents don't know that if you live within the "incorporated" town limits of the Town of North Beach (not the zip code zone) that you have free access to the beach and the fishing pier. You and your guests are entitled to a free visit to enjoy the beach areas and to go fishing. In order to take advantage of this free amenity, you will need to bring your current identification to the Town Hall to obtain a seasonal pass or present your identification at the Welcome Center for a day pass. Your guests, who will be free, must be with you at the time of check in at the Welcome Center. Why not take advantage of this special "town perk"? The Town Attendants are waiting to serve you. This is your town!

Bulk trash pickup is on a ONCE-A-MONTH BASIS, BY APPOINTMENT ONLY. Call Town Hall by the Friday prior to the monthly pickup date to schedule an appointment.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS (DPW) UPDATE

The cold days of winter seem only a distant memory now. DPW would like to thank town residents for their cooperation in dealing with the roadways this past winter, as it seemed we were getting a little snow every week, just enough to make commuting a little tricky.

Spring has sprung and mother nature has provided the area with some spring challenges, as well. In the month of May, the area experienced heavy rain and coastal flooding that caused road closings in the usual areas in town. Please remember, if you come upon a flooded street, DO NOT drive through. It is not worth taking the chance. Auto repairs from flooding are expensive on today's computer-controlled vehicles. Normally, you can avoid flooded streets by just going around the block. Residents are reminded when local weather reports are calling for coastal flooding or flash flooding, not to park in the areas that normally flood. The town is working on long-term solutions to help with coastal flooding, which seems to be happening more often each year. Several projects are in the works and are moving forward.

The town has also had some great weather, so hopefully you have had the chance to



get out and enjoy some recent improvements. The new bathrooms at the Welcome Center are up and running and have made great improvement for daily walkers and anyone enjoying the waterfront area during events. The Friday Night Farmers' Market is back and in full swing. So far, we have had some great Friday night weather to add to the festive atmosphere. The bike path along the boardwalk has been repaired and

repaved. At Wetlands Overlook Park, the walkway has been extended and now residents can enjoy a walk over the marsh and through the woods to the north end of Frederick Avenue.

DPW is currently focusing on storm drain issues throughout town by cleaning all existing storm drain boxes, clearing obstructions from existing pipes and replacing old and damaged pipes. This will be continuing throughout the summer.

Additional projects on DPW's radar include installing sidewalks in the area of 4th Street and Dayton Avenue, upgrading the sewer pump station located on Bay Avenue, and street repair.

Thank you for your support and patience as we work to maintain the town. Have a safe summer!

Recycling

EVERY WEDNESDAY

Beginning July 2, 2014, recycling will be collected **EVERY** Wednesday. Please note that items to be recycled DO NOT have to be separated. Look for the Residential Recycling Guide on the town website to aid in your recycling efforts.

Mosquito SPRAYING

Mosquito control spraying for North Beach takes place on Mondays and Thursdays, depending upon the mosquito count. Please dump any standing water in your yard to prevent mosquitoes from breeding. If you hear the spray truck coming, please go inside for a few minutes. The more residents that are off the streets, the more the spray trucks can spray.

HURRICANE SEASON: BE PREPARED

The Calvert County
Department of Public Safety,
Emergency Management
Division, encourages residents
to review hurricane preparedness
procedures and family plans as we enter
the 2014 mid-Atlantic hurricane season
which runs from June 1 through Nov.
30.

In the event of a major coastal storm, emergency management staff will provide information, precautionary advice and public safety instructions through local media, the county website, Facebook and the Calvert County ALERT notification system. Residents should bear in mind that sometimes the best course of action may be to shelter in place at home or work. At other times evacuations may be necessary and the amount of time available to leave may be limited.

Consider the following actions and be prepared in case these potentially dangerous storms threaten:

Prepare for High Winds ·

- . If necessary, protect all windows with shutters or 5/8-inch plywood panels.
- . Reinforce garage doors.
- Designate an interior room with no windows or external doors as a "safe room."
- Assess your landscaping and trees to ensure they do not become a wind hazard.

Prepare for Flooding

- Determine the elevation of your property to learn your vulnerability to flooding.
- Evaluate your insurance coverage. In flood-prone areas, keep materials on hand such as sandbags, plywood, plastic sheeting, plastic garbage bags, lumber, shovels, work boots and gloves.
- Be aware of areas known to flood so your evacuation routes are not cut off.



If Storms Approach

- Most mobile/manufactured homes are not built to withstand hurricane-force winds. Residents of these homes should relocate to safer structures if an evacuation order is issued.
- Secure lawn furniture and other outside objects that could become projectiles in high winds.
- Listen carefully for safety instructions from local officials. Monitor a NOAA weather radio.

During Storms

- Stay inside and away from windows, skylights and doors.
- If the power is out, listen to a battery -powered radio for storm updates.
- . Have flashlights/batteries handy and avoid open flames and candles.
- If power is lost, turn off major appliances to reduce damage when power is restored.

After Storms

- Stay away from downed or dangling power lines.
- Beware of weakened tree limbs.
- Open windows and doors to ventilate your house.
- To keep lines open, use your phone only in emergencies.
- . Do not drive into water of unknown depth.
- Restrict children from playing in flooded areas.
- Do not use fresh food that has come in contact with flood waters.
- Pump out wells and have the water tested before drinking.

The committee created the Resident Survey and provided recommendations to the mayor and council based on the results, which included an increase in recycling to one time per week, additional mutt mitt stations in town, a public awareness campaign to reduce litter and more! Action has begun on these items and you will see more in the coming months!

The committee has been closely involved and provides ongoing input on the flood remediation efforts and the

Army Corp's wetlands restoration project at the north end of town.

The committee raised awareness about the benefits of creating a living shoreline at Walton Beach to protect the beach and prevent further erosion. The town was recently awarded a more than \$500,000 grant for this project!

The committee also drew attention and supported an education initiative related to the town's wildlife including the Osprey and Horseshoe Crabs.

We can all play a role in keeping our town beautiful, clean and litter free by taking pride and doing our part. It can be one small thing such as making sure your trash bins are only visible during trash pickup, removing unsightly objects from your yard or even picking up a stray soda can on the boardwalk that isn't yours and throwing it in the trash can! USFWS GRANT ANNOUNCED

For the past several months, the town's consultant, Environmental Concerns, has been working on the design of the Living Shoreline Project for the town's Walton Preserve property. The living shoreline will create wetland areas behind a stone sill along the beach front that will protect the beach from erosion that is rapidly occurring at the site. One of the tasks performed by Environmental Concerns was to prepare an application to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) for a grant to help fund the construction of the Living Shoreline. USFWS has now announced that the town will receive at \$541,000 grant to help with the cost of the Living Shoreline. The next step in order for the project to move forward to construction is for the town to obtain Federal and State permits. Applications for these permits will be submitted in early July and are expected to be approved this fall.

The town is continuing with the design and permitting for the flood dike north of 9th Street. Permits for this project are also expected to be issued this fall.

OUR CHILDREN NEED YOU

In the Tri-County Area of Calvert, St Marys and Charles Counties, there are approximately 300 children and youth who need a family. These children, placed in foster care due to abuse and neglect, are awaiting the opportunity to safely return home or find a permanent home with other family members or through adoption. Families: you, your neighbors, your relatives, your fellow church members, co-workers and friends are desperately needed to open your hearts and homes to these children. Foster and adoptive parents (called "resource parents") have been providing this service to children and older youth for years. Resource parents need not be perfect, just patient; not wealthy, just welcoming; not full of answers, just willing to try and learn.

Resource parents play a vital role in improving the quality of life for children and youth. Resource parents help children and youth work through the trauma of being removed from home by keeping them connected to their community.

The need for resource parents is never really met. Some resource parents have the opportunity to adopt a child whom they have fostered. Sometimes, that means they stop fostering other youth, so new homes are needed. Some resource parents only want to foster

young children, leaving many of our older youth waiting for a family.
Finding resource parents for sibling groups, medically fragile children and children who have been in foster care for a long time is an ongoing challenge. There are also many ways to provide care for these children and youth if you cannot be a full-time resource parent: as a respite care provider for families who are fostering children, and as a mentor.

The tri-county departments of social services are actively looking for resource families across the three counties to care for children and youth in foster care. Each resource family is trained in specialized competencies, including, but not limited to, understanding abuse, grief and loss and building healthy relationships through strong families. Resource parents are supported in gaining the knowledge and skills needed to parent in ways that will meet the developmental, cultural and permanency needs of children.

BOARD PROCLAIMS APRIL AUTISM AWARENESS MONTH

It's a complex brain disorder and the numbers of individuals and families touched by it are rising dramatically. On Tuesday, April I the Calvert County Commissioners saluted the caring families, care providers and educators by proclaiming Autism Awareness Month in Calvert County.

"It's an everyday and lifelong disability," said Chip Gaither of The Autism Project of North Beach and Owings, a 15-year-old nonprofit organization that now serves Calvert and four surrounding counties.

County government employee Christine Finnamore told the board she had to revise her remarks since the latest available statistics show that one in 68—rather than one in 88 children—is diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). The numbers are higher for males—one in every 54 boys is diagnosed with ASD.

"Early intervention is key," said Finnamore, who urged parents to talk with their child's pediatrician and daycare provider.

There was encouraging news about ways Calvert is handling the ASD challenge. Finnamore commended Billy Saunders of the Prince Frederick Eagles Football team for making

accommodations so that her son could participate in the sport this past season. Gaither commended North Beach Mayor Mark Frazer for his work in helping The Autism Project acquire property within the town. There a home where ASD adults can experience independent living will be built.

"I'd like to think we're a bit of a trailblazer," said Gaither.

Calvert County Public Schools (CCPS) Special Education Director Christina Harris said the school system remains committed to fulfilling the charge of educating all students, especially those with disabilities. "We have high expectations for all of our students," said Harris.

"I see some success stories," said Commissioner Susan Shaw [R] who read and presented the proclamation.


April 2 was Autism Awareness Day nationally, with many homes, businesses and institutions participating in "Light It Up Blue."
