

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Dear North Beach Residents,

This edition of the town newsletter highlights the very busy and productive year North Beach has had in 2015.

Two significant capital projects were completed this past summer which will serve residents and visitors alike for many years. The new Sunrise Garden was opened on August 22, 2015 with a ribbon-cutting ceremony attended by Governor Larry Hogan, Maryland Senate President Mike Miller and the Calvert County Commissioners. We are especially appreciative of the effort made by Governor Hogan who made the visit even though he was in the middle of treatment for non-Hodgkin's lymphoma. Recent reports indicate that the Governor has now been declared cancer-free. Great news!

Secondly, the newly reconstructed and refurbished fishing pier has been widely praised for its new, fresh look and redesign with a separate fishing deck. The town will be aggressively marketing the new pier as a wedding and reception venue.

On another note, the town was very fortunate to have been selected by the American Planning Association (Chicago) to be the beneficiary of a town center master plan prepared by planners from different parts of the country. To that end, volunteers came together in North Beach for several days to study the area, receive input from business owners and the public and to prepare a report with specific recommendations which identify and enhance the small business and civic centers of town. Their report is available on the town's website. (See Page 2).

Finally, we have a fresh food market in town! North Beach is now the second location for Calvert's own Chesapeake's Bounty. Owned by founder, Will Kreamer, this important addition to town is located on

Bay Avenue next to Lighthouse Market and has already become a popular destination for those seeking always fresh, locally grown plants, produce, meat, seafood, dairy products and more.

As we approach the "off-season" for North Beach, on behalf of the town council and staff, I would like to wish you all a safe, happy and well-deserved holiday season.

AMERICAN PLANNING ASSOCIATION VISIT

In August, 2015, an American Planning Association (APA) Community Planning Assistance Team (CPAT) visited the Town of North Beach to help us create a plan for our "downtown" area (see photo).

North Beach has a population of approximately 2,000 within the incorporated area. Platted around the turn of the 20th century, North Beach originally had visions of being a vacation resort for wealthy residents of Washington, DC. Throughout its history, the town has had its ups and downs. It is currently experiencing a revival and renewal. However, the "downtown" area is largely undeveloped or underdeveloped. The Planning Commission of North Beach, with the blessing of the Mayor and Town Council, applied to APA for a CPAT team to help North Beach create a plan for the downtown area.

The CPAT visit, the public meetings and subsequent plan were a huge success. What made this successful was:

- . Committed elected representatives.
- . An effective communication strategy, including what the town already had in place.
- . An involved public.
- . An involved business community.
- . A dynamic CPAT leader.
- A well selected and very talented CPAT team and a very

talented pool of expert planning professionals that the American Planning Association has to choose from!

What will continue to make this successful is that the Town intends to implement as much of the Plan as is appropriate and practical, especially those elements that most strongly support economic development, and make North Beach a better place to work, live and play.





DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS (DPW) UPDATE

Hopefully everyone has had a chance to visit the new Sunrise Garden and the renovated town pier. DPW played a major role in both of these major projects and we are very pleased with the outcome. It was a pleasure to work on projects that are a nice asset to the town's public space and that can be enjoyed by all. Fall is here and it brings such beautiful color to the trees. The downfall to the picturesque foliage is that the leaves fall and become an obstruction for the stormwater collection system. DPW would like to remind residents that it is very important to properly dispose of your leaves, as this goes a long way in keeping the storm drains and collection boxes clean and working properly.

The town faired pretty well with the threat of the hurricane. We received more of a Nor'easter and didn't get as much rain as first predicted. The town did experience flooding at the normal locations. In the 5th Street area, we received four inches of rain prior to the storm's arrival. The 9th Street area did experience flooding from







abnormal high tides during a four -day period at the peak of the storm. The town has plans and has held a pre-construction meeting with Environmental Concerns, a contracting firm, to build a flood berm in this area. The berm is designed to be 3.5 feet above sea level and help to protect the area from this type of flooding. Construction is expected to start shortly after Thanksgiving.

Last, but not least, winter is not far off. With the way the weather changes around here, we could see snow at any time.

Remember, if you have off-street parking, please use it during snow events as it makes it much easier to plow the streets if vehicles are not in the way. Check the town's website for details on the snow removal policy and winter weather tips.

Holiday Decorations Throughout Town

The town employees and many volunteers have been decorating the town for the holiday season. It takes about 6-8 weeks to complete the installation prior to the official lighting of the tree and the annual parade and Santa on the Beach.

The total weight of all the decorations is over 6,000 pounds. There is one mile of extension cords to be installed. The Christmas tree is 22 feet tall, is adorned with over 800 ornaments and takes two days to decorate. There are 1,875 feet of garland from 1st Street to 5th Street (4 tenths of a mile) and is dressed with 68 bows. The eight, 8 foot figurines from the Nutcracker Suite Ballet, on the t-section of the pier, were created by students and volunteers from Abigail Francisco School of Classical Ballet. Installation usually takes over 500 hours to complete. We hope you enjoy the festive decorations!

LIVING SHORELINE PROJECT UPDATE

Environmental Concerns from St. Michaels,. MD has completed all the stone grading and initial planting work under their contract for which the town has a \$550,00 Grant from the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Foundation. Environmental Concerns will return to the site in the spring to reestablish any plantings that do not survive the winter months.

Wastewater Treatment PLANTUPGRADE

The project to upgrade the Chesapeake Beach Wastewater Treatment Plant to meet current State discharge requirements is now 70% complete. The scheduled completion date is lune, 2016. About 20% of the sewage treated by the plant is from North Beach. The total project costs is \$16.5 million. The Town of North Beach's share is \$3.2 million, which is funded by a grant and a loan from the State flush tax funding and the town sewer fund.

Sunrise Garden is open year-round, dawn to dusk. We ask that you please observe these general park rules to ensure everyone's visit is pleasant!

- No person or animal is allowed in the ponds or water features.
- No recreational motorized scooters, bicycles, skates, skateboards or rollerblades are allowed in park area.
- No family events or group activities allowed without a Town permit.



- . This is a DRUG-FREE, ALCOHOL-FREE and TOBACCO-FREE zone.
- . Children are to be supervised by an adult at all times; parents are responsible for children's behavior.
- . Pets must be on a leash.
- . No tents or tent-like structures are allowed.
- . No amplified music is allowed.
- . Grilling and/or open flames are not permitted.
- No picnicking allowed.
- . Do not feed the wildlife.

SOLAR PANELS

The Town of North Beach received grant funding from the Maryland Department of Energy in the amount of \$37,500.00. The project was awarded to Solar Tech. The

project is now 95% percent completed and includes 44 PV modules with two inverters. The interconnection of the solar panels to the BGE power grid is scheduled for the first week of December.

What's behind a Trash Can?

Have you noticed the new additional trash cans around town? Maybe the one on 8th Street or 2nd Street? Isn't it true that we just take trash cans for granted? We finish a soda or a sandwich and just toss the can or wrapper into a trash can that conveniently appears in our time of need! Do you ever wonder who thought to put a trash can right there in that perfect spot? Or, isn't it great that I don't have to walk five blocks with trash in hand?

In a joint effort this summer, the Environmental and Economic Development Committees joined forces, in the spirit of town beautification, to thoughtfully consider what additional locations need a trash receptacles. The committees gathered at the waterfront one summer evening, broke off into pairs with a town map in hand and traversed every street in North Beach! The teams had the following criteria in mind as they assessed new spots in desperate need of a trash can:

- Foot and car traffic resulting in trash and litter
- Line of sight between trash cans in heavily trafficked area
- Distribution throughout town not just the waterfront
- Avoiding location that would be displeasing to a homeowner or business

Following the survey of the town, the committees made a joint presentation to the council with their recommendations. The council ultimately approved 10 new trash cans in key locations throughout town. The new trash cans were then installed by the Public Works team the beginning of November. This is another critical step in making North Beach an even more beautiful and clean place to live.



We can all play a role in keeping our town beautiful, clean and litter free! One small thing can make a difference such as putting your trash bins away or throwing away a stray soda can that isn't even yours. Town pride is contagious.

The Environmental Committee meets at Town Hall the first Tuesday of each month at 7:00 pm. The Economic Development Committee meets at Town Hall the last Wednesday of each month at 7:00 pm.
