MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Dear North Beach Residents,

As the season changes and our very full event calendar winds down, I would like to express my appreciation to the residents most impacted by the large crowds for their patience and understanding. North Beach has become a very popular destination, especially every Friday evening from May to October, and it's gratifying to see the town make the many visitors feel welcome. Thank you!

At the October 9th Town Council Meeting, the last of the current administration, three very meaningful actions were taken by the members of the council. First, after a year of analysis, research and grant-seeking, the town was able to request proposals for the construction of a living shoreline on the site of the Walton Beach Nature Preserve. This project will result in the restoration of 50-60 feet of beach lost to erosion and stabilize the new shoreline with plantings and a stone sill. For this project, North Beach was awarded a \$540,000 grant from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation and the award was made to Environmental Concerns, a company out of St. Michaels, MD.

The same company was also awarded the contract to build an earthen dike to the south of the living shoreline which will help to prevent flooding in the 9th Street area following exceptionally high tides on the Bay. These flooding events certainly seem to be occurring with greater frequency. Work on this project will be coordinated with the living shoreline project.

The third action was to award the contract to construct the water feature in the Bayfront Park to the low-bidder, Knee-Deep Ponds. This project was re-bid last month after initial bids were rejected for being too high! An updated budget for the park was presented to the public which reflects the recent action of the Calvert County Open Space Committee to place the park in the county FY 2016 Capital Improvement Program for an award of \$125,000. When combined with State of Maryland grants of \$250,000 and private funding of \$30,000, the town will now be able to fully fund construction of the Bayfront Park

with <u>no expenditure of North Beach taxpayer's dollars</u>. Copies of the park budget are available from Town Hall. When finished, this park will preserve and protect the last green space which the town owns on the waterfront and add to the town's spaces where residents can relax and, in this case, enjoy what will be a beautiful asset to our town.

On behalf of the entire council, I would like to say it has been a privilege and an honor to have served you for the past four years. We all thank you for the opportunity and hope you feel, as we do, that North Beach is a better place today than it was when we were elected.

MUTT MITT STATIONS

The town has added more mutt-mitt stations for easy access in four convenient locations: the corner of 9th



Street and Atlantic Avenue, the entrance to Wetlands Overlook Park and at each entrance to Callis Park, This brings our count to 14 mutt-mitt stations along the waterfront, at Overlook Park and locations used by pet owners throughout the town. Thank you for cleaning up after your pet.

NEW FLOOD MANAGEMENT ORDINANCE

On October 9, 2014, the Town Council adopted a new Flood Management Ordinance that complies with all the current FEMA requirements for the town to remain eligible for flood insurance under the National Flood Insurance Program. All properties in the flood zone of North Beach are encouraged to maintain flood insurance on their property and building contents. In cases where property owners have mortgages through a federally regulated or supervised lending institution, flood insurance is mandatory.

In addition to the new Flood Ordinance, a new flood map prepared by FEMA will become effective on November 19, 2014. Both the new flood zone map and ordinance can be viewed on the town website.

Property owners should contact their insurance broker with questions about insurance requirements and the Town Zoning Administrator with any questions on the Flood Map and Ordinance.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS (DPW) UPDATE

I don't know about you, but it seems like I blinked and summer was over. Hopefully, everyone had a chance to get out and enjoy everything that was happening in town. This summer's weather really brought some beautiful days to enjoy outdoors. Public Works staff stayed busy throughout the season with continuing to make infrastructure improvements, helping with setting up for all the events, and daily

maintenance items that focused on general cleanup of the town. Some of the major projects included:

- Installing 450 feet of new storm drain pipe in the area of 8th Street and Chesapeake Avenue to solve a long standing problem with storm water in this area.
- Replacing approximately 100 feet of storm drain pipe throughout town to improve drainage in several areas.
- Installation of new sidewalk and curb along Dayton Avenue from 3rd Street to 5th Street. This has become a busy and popular area with the Bayside Boys and Girls Club, Bayside History Museum and the North Beach Senior Center all located in this block. The sidewalk and curb helped with pedestrian traffic and parking in the area.
- Upgrading of the Bay Avenue sewer station. This station was last upgraded in 1984 and is at the end of its normal operation life. A new diesel backup pump has been purchased and will be installed in the coming weeks. The station upgrade also includes the purchase of two new submersible pumps for daily operation of the station.

Work will begin in the near future on repairs and re-decking of the town pier. This work will also include a new section for fishing on the lower level of the pier. The paving contract has been awarded, and paving work will begin very soon on milling and re-paving of 2nd Street and related area. The town awarded a unit-price contract and will pave as many areas as the budget allows. Milling and paving along the new sidewalk on Dayton Avenue is also scheduled to be completed at this time. Please use off-street parking, if available, and be patient while this work is being done. Thank you in advance for your cooperation in making this work go as smoothly as possible.

Fall seems to be starting off with great weather! DPW will take advantage of this and continue working on general cleanup of the town, focusing on alleys, storm drain pipes and tree trimming. If you notice areas that need attention, please call Town Hall at 301.855.6681 and relay that information. Everyone be safe and enjoy the fall season!

Finish out the day with a drive-in movie. Join us at dusk on the visitor parking lot for a showing of *The Witches*.





ENVIRONMENTAL COMMITTEE

Many residents have asked, "What's up with Walton Beach? Why is there a No Entry sign if the town purchased the site with taxpayer's dollars? What is a nature preserve and what are the future plans for the beach?" These are all great questions that the Environmental Committee thought would be helpful to provide some answers to in this edition of the newsletter.

A Nature Preserve is defined as an area that is managed and operated to protect, maintain and restore natural features such as plants, animals, water quality and quantity, soil and geological features and ecological services & functions.

Walton Beach Nature Preserve requires special management activities because shoreline erosion rates are high, wetlands are susceptible to invasion from non-native species, the water quality is impacted from storm water run-off, and trash and other waste can easily overwhelm the public access areas.

The town purchased Walton Beach to protect it and restore it. As many of you know, the town recently received a large grant to build a living shoreline to prevent further erosion and restore the beach. The contract was awarded on October 9th and construction will soon begin.

The Environmental Committee is currently working on a list of

recommendations for appropriate future uses for the beach that are compatible with the living shoreline and other natural features. Some of these uses may include bird watching, nature study, beachcombing, and non-motorized boat launching such as stand-up paddle, kayaks and wind surfboards. Non-compatible uses may include picnicking, camping and other activities that would negatively impact the area.

We can all play a role in keeping our town beautiful, clean and litter free! One small thing can make a difference such as putting your trash bins away or throwing away a soda can that isn't even yours. Town pride is contagious!

The Environmental Committee meets at Town Hall the first Tuesday of each month at 7:00 pm. Please join us and share your ideas for making North Beach an even more beautiful place to live. If you would like to share your comments electronically, please email us at info@northbeachmd.org.

AN ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT STRATEGY

In the Spring, the EDC was tasked by the Mayor and Town Council to retain the services of a Business Consultant to review the business and economic climate of North Beach and provide suggestions and guidance for retaining current businesses and attracting new ones.

After issuing an RFP and reviewing a variety of proposals, with the approval of the Mayor and Town Council, we retained the services of Sage Policy Group and Dr. Anirban Basu.

In order to understand the community's business climate Dr. Basu was guided on a walking tour of the entire town. In addition, Dr. Basu conducted a combination of data analysis, interviews and focus groups. This included business owners, elected officials, real estate agents, developers, town employees and residents.

The report is a road map to the future business climate of North Beach. Dr. Basu has identified challenges such as seasonality, improvements on Chesapeake Avenue, competition from nearby towns, limited spending power and disunity between business and government. However, he sees the town's beauty and potential and offers suggestions for improvement. These suggestions include an Indoor Market, a hotel, including waterfront restaurants, a ballroom and meeting space. He also encourages town festivals and events planned jointly by both town and businesses, neighborhood beautification and an extensive media marketing campaign.

North Beach is a lovely walking town characterized by its small town charm, the spirit of comradery, local businesses, local events, historic residences and its jewel, the Chesapeake Bay. Tourists love it and residents call it home. This is an outside perspective with suggestions to improve and implement not to change the charm of North Beach.
