

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Dear Neighbors,

As you have no doubt noticed by this time, work is well underway on the Chesapeake Avenue streetscape! Improvements from 1st Street to 7th Street will include curbed, planted islands; new light poles; road raising and resurfacing; new sidewalks and crosswalks; and, an improved entrance to Callis Park. The purpose is both to make positive changes to the appearance of our main thoroughfare and to slow down the traffic which constantly speeds through town. Your patience is certainly appreciated while work proceeds in a planned attempt to finish before our Farmers' Market opens in May.

Also under construction at this time, after many months of delay due to the lengthy State and Federal permitting process, is the flood protection dike located just north of 9th Street between Bay and Atlantic Avenues. Environmental Concerns, the contractor for the dike construction, has worked conscientiously and patiently over the past two years on getting this project permitted by the Maryland Department of the Environment and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. This is the same contractor who designed and created the very successful living shoreline adjacent to the dike location on the Walton Beach Nature Preserve.

The "event" season for North Beach will begin with the opening of the Friday Night Farmers' Market on May 5th. This event, in its 9th year, will be held every Friday night until October 6th. Once again, there will be vendors on 5th Street; the Art Fair on Bay Avenue; the Classic Car Cruise-In on Bay Avenue; and music, dancing and a fun time on the boardwalk and beach (no admission fees). Be sure to take advantage this summer of Southern Maryland's #I-rated Farmers' Market!

Other events planned for the warm weather season are the End Hunger Dragon Boat Festival, DrinkMaryland (hosted by the Maryland Wineries Association), and new this year, our first North Beach American Film Festival. More information on these events can be found elsewhere in this newsletter.

Finally, the town has now received the final report from the firm contracted to do a feasibility study for a North Beach Performing

Arts Center. Their bottom line recommendation is that, in order to be feasible as an ongoing concern, the center needs to be supplemented by the creation of a nearby hotel/conference center and waterfront restaurants. The town is in discussions with representatives from the private development community to see if this "partnership" can be realized.

I hope that you are rested and ready for an exciting spring and summer in the Jewel of the Chesapeake Bay—North Beach!

code zone) that you have free access to the beach and the fishing pier. You and your guests are entitled to a free visit to enjoy the beach areas and to go fishing. In order to take advantage of this amenity, you will need to bring your current identification to the Town Hall to obtain a seasonal pass. Your guests, who will be

free, must be with you at the time of check in at the Welcome Center. Why not take advantage of this special "town perk"? The Town Attendants are waiting to serve you.

AMERICA IN BLOOM

The Town of North Beach is excited to be participating in the America in Bloom program for the first time. America in Bloom is a national awards program based on building pride in your community and promoting beautification through education and community involvement. The program encourages the use of flowers, plants, trees, and other environmental and lifestyle enhancements. Participants experience better cooperation amongst municipal, commercial and residential sectors because everyone works toward a common goal. The Town

of North Beach hopes this program will inspire businesses and residents to promote town pride and community involvement.



We are currently in the beginning

stages of the program and have held initial meetings. Greenstreet Gardens is partnering with the town and will be assisting with the flowers in the planter boxes on Bay Avenue at our annual Plant the Town Day on Saturday, April 29, 2017. We are excited to be a part of this national program and hope to continue to participate for many years.

PLANT THE TOWN



It's not too late! Volunteers will be needed for the 10th annual Plant the Town in conjunction with Earth Day. We will begin planting the flower beds along Bay Avenue at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, April 29, 2017. Join Comcast volunteers, the North Beach House and Garden Club, the Red Hatters, the Bayside Boys and Girls Club, and many other volunteers to beautify our town. Comcast is proud, once again, to be part of this event and has designated the Boys and Girls Club as its "Charity of Choice". Register at the Welcome Center on the day of the event.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS (DPW) UPDATE

BEACH DREDGE: The beach dredge project includes dredging in the waterway adjacent to the town beach. The material dredged from the offshore area will be stockpiled and used for beach replenishment. The purpose of this project is to create a deeper swimming area and a larger beach area. The lengthy delay in securing the permit from the State and Federal Agency will mean this project will be rescheduled until January 2018.

RAISING RT. 261: MD State Highway Association (SHA) is moving forward with design and permitting for a project to raise MD Rt. 261 between 9th Street and the Anne Arundel County line. The purpose of the project is to get the road surface above tidal flooding and provide a high point in the roadway to connect the flood dike. SHA's environmental and highway design work is progressing. The town will be applying for grant funding for a proposed elevated walkway on the west side of Rt. 261 in this area. SHA has forwarded the following project schedule to the town: Preliminary investigation complete by July 2017; plans/specs estimated for completion August 2019; advertise for bids November 2019; open bids February 2020; award contract and notice to proceed April 2020.

FLOOD DIKE: The work on the flood dike includes construction of about 1,000 feet of an earthen berm to protect the area north of 9th Street between Bay Avenue and Atlantic Avenue from higher than normal tidal events. The work includes restoration/stabilization of approximately 50,000 square feet of vegetated wetland. Town staff recently met with wetland permit agencies to get an update on the progress with the flood dike modification. During the meeting, the revised plans and drawings were reviewed. The town received permits for continuing the work on the flood dike with modifications approved from the original design from MDE and the Army Corps of Engineers after a long review process. Work has recently resumed.

RAISING CHESAPEAKE AVENUE: This project includes the reconstruction of an approximately 300 foot section of Chesapeake Avenue between 3rd and 5th Streets. The purpose of this project is to reduce the number of flooding events which close Chesapeake Avenue. The work includes curb and sidewalk removal, installing new curbing and sidewalks, asphalt pavement construction and related grading and adjustments to utility structures.

Preliminary work on this project has been completed by DPW. This includes removing the fence from around the existing sewage pumping station, backfilling the area to bring it up to the new grade, raising the storm drain in the grass area to the new grade elevation, and removing and relocating the water hydrant. Work performed by the contractor has begun and is expected to be completed around the beginning of May.

CHESAPEAKE AVENUE STREETSCAPE: The purpose of the Chesapeake Avenue Streetscape project is to improve the streetscape on the main street through town and also improve pedestrian safety. This project will give Chesapeake Avenue a more "Main Street" look. The total project includes construction of curbed islands for plantings, sidewalk reconstruction, fencing and new improvements to the Callis Park, milling and re-paving of Chesapeake

Avenue from 1st Street to 7th Street to include the addition of new light poles with banners and the ability for decorative features and crosswalk improvements in this area. Work has begun and will be done in phases. Roadwork, including tree wells, is expected to be completed the beginning of May. New lights and plantings will follow. Work will be going on simultaneously at Callis Park.

WATER TOWER: Contractors began repainting the town water tower. The work is expected to last about three weeks.

SEA WALL: The Atlantic Avenue sea wall repairs were completed and the new jersey barriers were placed and painted. Only the south end of Atlantic Avenue was affected.

SCOOP THE POOP

Help stop pointless poo-llution! When you fail to pick up after your pooch, you may

be doing more than upsetting the many residents and visitors to our town. A quick rain shower is all it takes to transfer dog droppings from the ground and into the Chesapeake Bay.

There are 14 mutt-mitt stations around town for easy access. Thank you in advance for cleaning up after your pet!



CREPE MYRTLE TRIMMING

You may have noticed the Crepe Myrtles along the boardwalk have been trimmed back. We wanted to give you some history on this type of pruning – called pollarding. Town resident, Bill Poole, started pollarding the crepe myrtles along Bay Avenue in 2006. The reasons for pollarding the crepe myrtles are to keep the height in balance to the size of the flower beds, minimize the root growth to protect the sprinkler system and allow for the perfect size tree to decorate with holiday lights during the winter season.

Pollarding is a pruning regime which maintains a tree at a given height permanently. Optimally, this is done with young trees — three years after planting or so — once the desired plant structure and height has been attained. At that point, the tree is topped. In a pollarded tree, all the sprouts of the

previous year are removed to their base each winter. This permits the tree to develop knobby structures called pollard heads, which form natural defenses against wound decay.

Pollarding is a common technique applied to street trees in Europe as a way to keep their top growth in check. One of the most conspicuous displays of pollarded Natchez crepe myrtles is at the National Gallery of Art's Sculpture Garden on the Mall. Here, more than 20 have been pollarded every winter to reduce the canopy. The pollard heads are now the size of softballs, or larger.

WHAT'S NEW AT THE BAYSIDE HISTORY MUSEUM

THE CIRCUS HAS COME TO TOWN! The Ringling Brothers were seven siblings who transformed their small touring company of performers into one of America's largest circuses in the late 19th and 20th centuries. From 1884 to 1918 the Ringling Brothers were the Kings of the circus.



The Bayside History Museum is proud to display an unusual collection of the original Ringling Bros. & Barnum and Bailey circus collection on loan from the Shire family. Phil Shire's great-grandfather and grandfather were both musicians for the circus traveling all over the country.

The Ringling brothers had purchased Barnum & Bailey Ltd. following Bailey's death in 1906, but ran the circuses separately until they were merged in 1919. Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus packs up its tent in May 2017. After you've enjoyed the circus, check out the new traveling exhibit dedicated to World War I and World War II and the ALA library services. Enjoy photos of men reading in the war library service station, Red Cross Building, Walter Reed Hospital between 1909 and 1920.

The Bayside History Museum is open Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday from I to 4 p.m., May 1st through October 31st. FIX THAT LEAK!

Fixing a toilet leak is a great way to reduce household water use and boost water conservation. If your toilet has a leak, you could be wasting about 200 gallons of water every day. That would be like flushing your toilet more than 50 times for no reason! Try this experiment: Test for leaks by placing a drop of food coloring in the toilet tank. If the color shows up in the bowl without flushing, you have a leak!

Dogs Running

AT LARGE

Please be reminded that Article II Dogs, Section 26-3 of the code of the Town of North Beach states that no person shall own or harbor within the Town of North Beach any dog unless such dog is licensed as provided by the ordinances and regulations of Calvert County. All ordinances and regulations of Calvert County concerning dogs shall apply within the corporate limits of the Town of North Beach. In addition, this includes the provisions of the Calvert County Code which call for all dogs to be on a leash when in the company of their owner outside the confines of the owner's property. In addition, it is expressly prohibited for any dog to be on the town beach, whether said dog be at large or on a leash. It is the intention of the Council that dogs are prohibited on the sand beach under all circumstances.

Additionally, Section 26-7, Enforcement, states that the Mayor, Town Code Enforcement Officer, Deputies of the Calvert County Sheriff's Department, and Dog Wardens of Calvert County shall have jurisdiction within the corporate limits of North Beach to enforce all provisions of this article. Section 26-8, Violations and penalties states that violations of this article shall be a municipal infraction.



END HUNGER DRAGON BOAT FESTIVAL

Town Codes

FOR YOUR INFORMATION

§ 45-2 <u>Burning within</u> the town.

There shall be no burning within the town limits for any purpose except cooking food purposes.

§ 108-4 <u>Abandoned and/or inoperable vehicles on private property.</u>

[Amended 6-11-1991 by Ord. No. 10-91] Any vehicle not properly tagged and or registered or that is in any state of disrepair and not operable cannot stay on private property more than 48 hours without property owners consent. After 48 hours, vehicles under any of the above must be stored in a permanent structure out of the public view.

§ 108-5 <u>Unregistered vehicles</u>, parking prohibited; vehicles impounded.

[Amended 5-12-1983 by Res. No. 2-83; 6-11-1991 by Ord. No. 10-91; 7-18-1996 by Ord. No. 3-96]

Any vehicle not properly tagged and/or registered or that is in any state of disrepair and not operable on any part of town property including alleys, parking lots and or rights of way must be removed within 48 hours or brought into compliance.

§ 108-7 Parking restrictions.

[Amended 2-13-1986 by Ord. No. 1-86; 7-18-1996 by Ord. No. 3-96; 6-18-2000 by Ord. No. 06-00]

Boats, trailers (utility, recreational), RVs, Tractor Trailers, and heavy commercial vehicles are prohibited from parking on town rights of way, parking lots, or alleys.
