MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Dear Neighbors,

Well, another busy year has come and gone! The town is now entering a "quiet" period for four months when events are at a minimum and North Beach is able to rest, recover and prepare for the warmer weather and the tourists that arrive in the late spring.

Congratulations to the town staff for the excellent job they did last year and thank you to our many visitors who enjoyed North Beach and who, in the annual Bay Weekly "Best of the Bay" contest, voted North Beach:

- Best Bay Beach
 - Best Community Event: Bay Harvestfest
- Best Town or Neighborhood
- Best Farmers' Market

On another note, the town has a full schedule of capital projects which have either been completed, are nearing completion or will start in 2014. You probably have noticed the Municipal Parking Lot on Chesapeake Avenue, near 7th Street. Access to Bay Avenue has been completed and work is progressing for an additional access to 7th Street. A boardwalk trail in the Overlook Park has recently been completed which provides access to the Park from town-owned property behind Burnt Oaks. A wildlife observation path will be constructed on this property in the foreseeable future. We are now doing renovations and expansion work on the Welcome Center. In its present size it can no longer handle the demand that summer crowds place on the facility (which was built in 2000). Also, extensive work will be done on the pier as a new lower level fishing platform is created and the upper level is improved to make the pier more attractive as a wedding venue. Much needed repairs will also be done on many of the pilings which support the pier deck and which, in some instances, are over 40 years old. Finally, we will soon be going out to bid on the first phases of the 3rd Street Park development. When finished, this park will provide a beautiful and peaceful setting for the enjoyment of our residents and guests.

Thank you to all our residents who take pride in their homes and in the appearance of the town. Your efforts in maintaining your

property are appreciated by your neighbors and by the town. For those who decorated for the holidays, another thank you and congratulations to the winners of the Holiday Highlights competition. See page 7 for the list of winners.

Let's get through the winter and before we know it, mild weather, flowers blooming and springtime showers will be here!

NEWS FROM THE WATERFRONT

The beach and Welcome Center will open on April 27, 2014. The hours of operation are as follows:

- April 27 through May 23: 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday
- May 24 through September 20: 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Mark your calendars for March 10, 2014 to remind you to visit the Town Hall for your annual beach pass and vehicle parking stickers. Beginning March 10th, you may obtain passes and parking stickers Monday through Friday, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Proof of residency is required. Beach Passes and Parking Stickers

are valid from May 1st through October 31st for each calendar year. Town residents will be issued beach passes. You must reside within the town limits to obtain a parking sticker. A copy of your lease agreement for rentals and each vehicle registration showing proof of residency must accompany request (application available at Town Hall and on website) for sticker. Property



owners who reside within the town limits will be issued a permanent sticker for each vehicle. Property owners who do not reside within the town limits will not be issued a parking sticker. Renters within the town limits will be issued a parking sticker valid until April 2015. All sticker requests will be verified by the property records we have on file for the address. Vacation rentals may obtain daily beach passes at the Welcome Center, but must show their Lease Agreement each visit. For more information contact Town Hall at 410.257.9618 or 301.855.6681.

DOGS RUNNING AT LARGE

Please be reminded that Article II Dogs, Section 26-3 of the code of the Town of North Beach states that no person shall own or harbor within the Town of North Beach any dog unless such dog is licensed as provided by the ordinances and regulations of Calvert County. All ordinances and regulations of Calvert County concerning dogs shall apply within the corporate limits of the Town of North Beach. In addition, this includes the provisions of the Calvert County Code which call for all dogs to be on a leash when in the company of their owner outside the confines of the owner's property. In addition, it is expressly prohibited for any dog to be

on the town beach, whether said dog be at large or on a leash. It is the intention of the Council that dogs are prohibited on the sand beach under all circumstances.

Additionally, Section 26-7, Enforcement, states that the Mayor, Town Code Enforcement Officer, Deputies of the Calvert County Sheriff's Department, and Dog Wardens of Calvert County shall have jurisdiction within the corporate limits of North Beach to enforce all provisions of this article. Section 26-8, Violations and penalties states that violations of this article shall be a municipal infraction. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS (DPW) UPDATE

So far this year, winter has been kind to our area, but as anyone knows who has lived here any length of time, that can change overnight. Here is a brief outline of the town's snow removal plan in case we receive winter precipitation. Pre-storm, prior to the snow fall, streets will receive a treatment of salt or chemicals, depending upon forecast conditions. When snow reaches a height of three inches, town staff will begin plowing. The staff will try to maintain two clear lanes on all streets and intersections starting with main accesses to and from town and working outward. Please remember in these types of events to use off-street parking, if available, as this is a great help to crews that are trying to clear streets. Once the streets are clear, crews will start clearing parking areas. This will be done while residents are at work or away from the home, which allows crews to be more efficient when parked cars are clear from normal parking areas. Every effort will be made to ensure residents

have a safe travel to and from work, etc. For a complete copy of the Snow Removal Plan, please visit the Department of Public Works link under the Government tab on the town website.

Work is going to start soon on renovation of the Welcome Center bathrooms. This is a much-needed update to the existing restrooms which will make for a more pleasant experience for everyone visiting the area.

The new walkway





trail from the Burnt Oaks neighborhood to the Wetlands Overlook Park is now in use. Please come out and enjoy this beautiful, sometimes forgotten, part of town. DPW has started on a second walkway from the new town parking lot location on Chesapeake Avenue. This walkway will allow foot traffic to travel from the parking lot to 7th Street. This will allow easier access to all the businesses located in that area.

Flood Zone Mapping

CHANGES

In March 2013, FEMA issued Preliminary Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs) for areas of Calvert County, including the Town of North Beach. When these maps are approved by FEMA for use by the town's flood management measures, the town will be adopting an updated Flood Management Ordinance that will include the new mapping and improved flood management measures that FEMA requires in order for properties in the town flood plain area to be eligible for flood insurance. The town expects to be starting the process of updating it's Flood Management Ordinance in February and completing in the fall of 2014. The new flood maps will replace the FIRMs last adopted in 2011. There are significant changes in the Special Flood Hazard Area boundaries in the area of the Atlantic Avenue properties south of Seventh Street. The new Preliminary FIRMs will soon be available on the town's website. A copy of the current Flood Ordinance is already on the website. Please contact Town Hall with any questions about the town's flood management program and flood insurance. 3

3rd Street Park UPDATE

CPH, the Town's designer for the 3rd Street Park has now completed pre-final drawings and specifications for the development of a neighborhood park at the corner of Bay Avenue & 3rd Street. Town staff is now working on funding for the park and developing a phasing plan so the construction can be staged as funding becomes available. In the fall of 2013, Town Public Works completed preliminary grading at the site. The plans for the park can be viewed on the town's web site..

IT TAKES FIVE WEEKS TO DECK OUR HALLS

As you may have noticed the Town of North Beach added some new decorations this year to complement our existing decorations. If you are new to the town, here are some impressive facts for you:

- . The town employees and many volunteers decide to get started decorating the second week in November (and working with the weather) to get the installation completed prior to the official lighting of the tree and the annual Santa on the Beach and parade.
- . The total weight of all the decorations is over 5,000 pounds.
- . The Christmas tree is 22 feet tall and is adorned with over 800 ornaments.
- . There is 1,875 feet of garland from 1st Street to 5th Street (4 tenths of a mile) dressed with 78 bows.
- The fourteen, 8-foot figurines from the Nutcracker Suite Ballet, on the grassy lot at 3rd Street and Bay Avenue, were created by students and volunteers from Abigail Francisco School of Classical Ballet.
- Total installation takes about 30 days and over 500 hours to complete.

ANNUAL POLAR BEAR PLUNGE

What we call the "coolest" event of the year, proved to be just that. With a water temperature of just 38 degrees and an air temperature of 46 degrees, 355 brave Polar Bear Plungers jumped into the Chesapeake Bay on January 1, 2014. Because of the low tide level, the plunge was held on the south side of the pier this year. There were thousands of spectators perched on the boardwalk, finger piers and even on the rocks.



Again this year, there were three ways to participate in the plunge. Participants could pre-register on

the town's website and pay a \$25 registration fee that ensured them a longsleeve 2014 Polar Bear Plunge t-shirt and a personalized certificate. Participants could also pay the registration fee the day of the plunge and still receive a tshirt and certificate, although it was first come-first served. The final way to participate was to sign the plunge waiver and jump in!

The town acquired business sponsors for this year's event. As part of the sponsorship, businesses earned a spot on the town's 2014 Special Events Banner. This banner will be proudly hung at the boardwalk during this calendar year.

Finally, the net proceeds of the 2014 Polar Bear Plunge will be given to the Chesapeake Bay Foundation. The Town of North Beach is very pleased with the turnout of bears and spectators and also pleased to be able to provide 13 such an enjoyable afternoon for so many as we kickoff a new year!
