MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Dear North Beach Residents,

We will certainly remember the summer of 2012. The “derecho” of June 29th with its hurricane-force winds, the oppressive 100° plus heat wave for over a week and, worst of all, the loss of power suffered by many during this time of excessive temperature. During this period, the North Beach Town Hall, which has generator back-up, was open for heat-related emergencies, such as the need for cooling, water and for charging electronic devices. Please take note that in future instances of emergencies affecting the town, our town hall will make every effort to provide information and relief for North Beach residents.

As for what’s happening in town this summer, the most significant change is the relocation of the Calvert County Parks and Recreation programs from the North Beach Community Center to the Boys and Girls Club building at 4th Street and Dayton Avenue. The grand re-opening is scheduled for Tuesday, July 24th at 3:00. Everyone is welcome to attend! The community center building will become the new home of the Bayside History Museum. The larger accommodations will make possible an expanded number of exhibits and finally the museum will have adequate parking and accessibility for the handicapped. Be sure to visit later in the fall to take in the history of the greater North Beach area.

Look for large recycling containers to begin appearing around town this summer. These 32-gallon bins will, we hope, encourage greater recycling efforts among residents. Recycling pickup schedules will remain the same for the time-being as we assess the level of customers’ participation. The expanded recycling program is voluntary so please notify Town Hall if you would like a large container delivered to your home.

Finally, I would like to wish Jane Humphrey a Happy 100th Birthday!

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS (DPW) UPDATE

Well, summer season is in full swing, to say the least. With temperatures setting records this early, it could make for a long hot summer! Check page 4 for some HOT WEATHER TIPS to get you through the season.

The DPW staff has been busy in this heat. Have you noticed the new, white sand on the beach? We re-graded the north side of the beach and added 60 tons of sand. The area needed replenishment due to storms and erosion. DPW staff also painted the seawall on Atlantic Avenue and added new signs to help control traffic in the area of 9th Street and Atlantic Avenue.

On Friday, June 30th the area experienced a severe storm with high winds causing a lot of tree damage and power outages. All of the town's sewage pumping stations lost power and were running on back-up generator power for a minimum of 18 hours, some longer. The town's water system was also without power during this period. Power was restored to the well pump sites the next evening. The power outage caused damage to the control system of the wells and they had to be run in the manual mode until repairs were made on a few days later. DPW removed tree limbs and debris during the week following the storm.

Along with the routine tasks of the DPW department, they have repaired a water main break, responded to sewer blockages and jetted the line to clear it, and installed the jelly fish net.

Remember, with the summer heat also comes the threat of severe thunderstorms. Be aware of this while at the beach. If a storm approaches, please put down umbrellas and chairs and secure other items. Strong winds could turn these items into projectiles. Seek shelter immediately as lightning and water doesn't make for a safe environment. Check out your back-up generators and make sure you have batteries in case of a power outage.

SPECIAL THANKS TO TOWN RESIDENTS

Thanks to town residents and property owners, the appearance of our town has greatly improved! Residents have responded to requests and have worked diligently to improve their properties by painting and repairing fences. More than 100 fence issues have been addressed and improved. The Town of North Beach has received positive feedback! We appreciate your hard work, time and energy! Improving the appearance of the town has always been our goal and with your cooperation, we are doing just that.

As temperatures soar this summer, continue take the necessary precautions to prevent heat-related illnesses and continue to check on your family, friends and neighbors who may be vulnerable to the extreme heat.

HOT WEATHER TIPS:

- Drink plenty of fluids such as water and fruit juices to prevent dehydration .
- Wear loose-fitting, lightweight, and light-colored clothes.
- Avoid direct sunlight by staying in the shade or by wearing sunscreen, a hat and sunglasses.
- When possible, stay in air-conditioned areas. If your home is not air-conditioned, consider a visit to a shopping mall or public library.
- NEVER leave pets or young children in a car, even with the windows cracked.
- Check on elderly relatives or neighbors daily. If you are concerned about an older or vulnerable person, call 211 for assistance.
- Take it easy when outdoors. Athletes and those who work outdoors should, if possible, take short breaks when feeling fatigued. Schedule physical activity during the morning or evening when it is cooler.

NEW TRASH, BULK AND RECYCLABLE POLICY

Effective September 1, 2012, the following changes will be instituted to the Town of North Beach trash, bulk and recyclable collection policy. Important changes that all residents must adhere to are the following:



A. Household Trash and Yard Waste

1. There will be no alleyway pickups. All trash must be placed outside the property line at the curb or edge of the road surface. If you have a corner property, you can place it on either street.
2. All household trash must be bagged and secured in 35-gallon or smaller container.
3. Yard waste must be bagged and placed next to your cans for pick-up.
4. Sticks, tree limbs, and branches must be cut into three-foot lengths and bundled or secured together or placed in a trashcan.
5. Yard waste will be picked up at the curb along with household trash.

6. All containers must be removed from the curb after trash collection.

B. Bulk Trash

1. Bulk trash will be on a once-a-month basis, by appointment only.
2. To schedule an appointment, please contact the Town Hall at 410.257.9618 or 301.855.6681. When you call, you must provide the number of items to be picked up and a brief description of each item. You also need to provide a contact name, street address and phone number.
3. We will pick up refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, mattresses, sofas, tables, chairs, appliances, etc.



C. Unacceptable Waste

Unacceptable wastes shall include, without limitation, any regulated quantity of a Hazardous Waste or Hazardous Substance as defined by federal, state or local laws or regulations; containerized wastes, the contents of which are not able to be identified; sludges; waste from a pollution control process or cleanup of a spill of a chemical substance or commercial product; any dead animal or animal part; biohazards or regulated medical waste, friable asbestos, construction and demolition waste, soil, sod, tree stumps, paint, lead acid batteries, motor oil, or any item too large or too heavy to be loaded in collection vehicles with assistance.

D. Recyclable Materials

1. Recyclables will be picked up every other Wednesday at the curbside.
2. Recyclables must be placed in recycle containers and can be commingled.
3. For guidance on recyclable items, please refer to the Residential Recycling Guide that is available on the town website under the Residents, Town Business tab. You may also pick up a hard copy at Town Hall.
4. To request recycle bins and lids, go to the town website at www.northbeachmd.org, under the Quick Links on the left side of the page, click on RECYCLE BIN REQUEST. Complete this online form and then click SEND. You may also fill out a hard copy of the request form at Town Hall.

Note: Trash must be bagged, placed in a trash can with a lid and curbside before 6 a.m. on Monday and Friday.
