Message from the Mayor

LATE, GREAT BREAKING NEWS! *The Calvert County Board of Library Trustees has unanimously recommended, and the Board of County Commissioners has concurred, that the new Twin Beaches Library will be sited in North Beach at the intersection of Chesapeake Avenue and 3rd Street! There will be time needed for design and engineering work but one day, in the foreseeable future, the residents of North Beach will have a 21st Century library for their use and within walking distance. We are all excited about this future project. Stay tuned for updates from Town Hall!*

Dear Neighbors,

The 2018 event season began on May 4th with the opening night of the Farmers' Market. All in one evening, spring arrived and hundreds of people arrived for the long-awaited night!

You have probably noticed the most obvious capital project undertaken in April...the dredging and restoration of our beach area. Over 3,000 cubic yards of sand has been returned to the beach (from where it came) and now both the swimming area and the beach area have been increased! Beach management is a never-ending maintenance issue as storms and higher tides erode our shoreline and efforts such as we have undertaken last month will be required again at some point in the future. Until then, please enjoy the "new" beach in North Beach.

Two new projects on the boardwalk are also underway this spring. The construction of the "Shirt Shack" will make possible the purchase of official North Beach items and wearing apparel. The town has recently received trademark approval for its logo and tag-line, "The Jewel of the Chesapeake Bay".

Also under construction, a new covered, fixed pavilion for the expanded boardwalk section where outdoor performances and events are held. This 600 square

foot structure will provide better shelter than the temporary tents we have used in the past and will free up the waterfront staff from repeated "setting up" and "tearing down" the tents. This open air pavilion will be a useful addition for the gatherings held at the waterfront.

Finally, significant improvements have been made to Callis Park in the way of fencing, new playground equipment and ground cover. Please note the new sculpture in the park and the custom metal sculpture which serves as the main gate to the park. A recognition ceremony was held May 11th to thank The Arts Council of Calvert County and The Maryland State Arts Council for their support of the arts in North Beach (details elsewhere in the newsletter).

We expect a very busy season between now and October. Please enjoy and thank you in advance for your patience and understanding as the town makes every effort to accommodate the crowds with as little inconvenience to residents as possible.

According to Section 19-608 of the Charter of The Town of North Beach, each person seeking nomination to public office at the general election for the Town of North Beach shall file a certificate

of candidacy for nomination. Such person who is a candidate for public office must be a full-time resident and registered voter of the Town of North Beach. If you are a registered voter with Calvert County, you are registered with North Beach. All interested individuals should file their paperwork with Stacy Wilkerson, Town Clerk, by Tuesday,

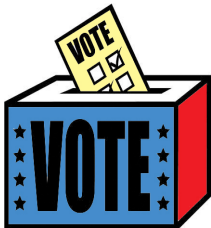

Department of Public Works Update

It was a long time coming, but it looks like spring has finally sprung. With the temperatures getting warmer and the days getting longer, now would be a great time to do some outdoor spring cleaning. I bring this up because not only does this greatly improve the appearance and value of your property and the overall town, it goes a long way in helping maintain the storm drain collection system. Spring and summer storms that roll through the area, at times, can drop two inches of rain pretty quickly. This causes leaves and debris to clog ditch lines, collection pipes and storm drain grates. When this happens, water backs up and will go into unwanted places. By doing a good spring cleaning of your yard and removing leaves, tree limbs and debris that has built up over the winter, it will help the town to avoid some of this problem.

While you are outside doing some clean up, it wouldn't be a bad idea to check on your sewer clean out pipe to make sure the cap is not broken and is still in place. Check your gutters and downspouts on your home to make sure they are clean and free flowing. Not only does doing this help protect the foundation of your home by removing water away from your house, but it also helps keep the water from doing any kind of damage to your roof. A general look around after the winter

months may go a long way in avoiding a major issue later.

Lastly, if you happen to notice an elderly neighbor or someone

physically unable to clean up, give them a hand or let us know by calling the Town Hall at 301.855.6681.



Whether you call it a potty, commode, or a porcelain throne ... we need to talk about it for a minute! The town's sewer system has recently been clogged with items like baby wipes, disposable diapers, hand towels and hair extensions. Yes, you heard me right...HAIR EXTENSIONS! NONE of these things should ever be flushed! Even if that product label says it is "flushable," don't do it! Throw it in the trash! All joking aside, the ONLY things that should be flushed down the toilet are urine, feces and toilet paper.

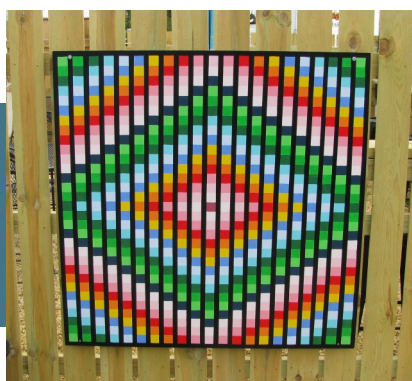


Flush This . . . But Not That!

When you use your toilet, shower, washing machine or dishwasher, waste water leaves your home through pipes that connect to the town sewer system. Many materials frequently flushed or poured down the drain can harm the pipes that connect to the town sewer system. Every property owner connected to the town sewer system can be a potential contributor to sewer problems, and a potential victim of those problems. Putting the wrong things down the drain can damage the sewer system, cause sewer backups in your home, and sewer releases to the environment. The only thing you should ever flush down a toilet is human waste (urine and feces) and toilet paper. Please keep in mind, products that are labeled as "flushable" are not sewer friendly and should not be flushed. Here is a list of some of things to keep OUT of the toilet:

- disposable diapers
- baby wipes
- tampons
- cotton balls and swabs
- mini or maxi pads
- unused medications
- condoms
- cleaning wipes of any kind
- facial tissue
- bandages and bandage wrappings
- disposable hand towels and mechanic's shop rags
- makeup removal wipes

Another culprit that causes blocked sewer pipes is grease. Never pour grease in your sink drain. When grease washes down the sink, it sticks to the insides of the pipes that connect your home to the town's sewer. It also coats the insides of the town's sewer pipes. Eventually, the grease will build up and can completely block sewer pipes. That can create difficult and expensive maintenance problems for both the town and private property owners. To prevent sewer backups and blockages, please be mindful of what items you are flushing down your toilets and pouring into your sink drains!



The Calvert Barn Quilt Trail Comes to North Beach

Enjoy a delightful walking tour of the three newest squares on the Calvert Barn Quilt Trail located in right here in your town. The barn quilt plaque is a replica of one square from a quilt, painted on plywood and mounted on the side of a barn, building or free standing frame. 1. Maple Leaf at Chesapeake's Bounty: The classic Maple Leaf quilt design is a perfect fit for Chesapeake's Bounty. Chosen and painted by Veronica Cristo of Chesapeake's Bounty, the Maple Leaf reminds us that trees help sustain life as we know it. Veronica and Will Kreamer, founder of Chesapeake's Bounty and a third generation farmer, believe in the health and economic benefits of local food, supporting local farmers, watermen, and other producers and paying fair market prices for their products. The new North Beach Market is an ideal complement to their local food system vision in that it brings local food from throughout the Chesapeake Bay Watershed right to the doorstep of the community.

2. Trip Around the World at The Wheel Store: The Trip Around the World quilt block hanging on the back fence at The Wheel Store was first designed by Marilou Winkler, age 87, as a quilt to be raffled off at a fundraiser at The Wheel for the National Parkinson's Foundation, to honor Marilou's school principal who was diagnosed with the disease. The Wheel, established in 2011 by Celia Molofsky, is a "Boutique-Gallery-Tavern" whose goal is to support the community through the Arts. Hosting the fundraiser for Parkinson's research is one of the ways she is doing just that.

3. Sister's Choice at Sisters' Corner: With a multitude of quilt block patterns available, the

decision to pick this one was an easy choice for sisters Kathy Brookes and Carol Koenig, owners of Sisters' Corner since 2007. Their research led them to the naming of the Sister's Choice block by the Ladies' Art Company in St. Louis about 1890, in honor of British novelist Jane Austen and her sister Cassandra. They were devoted sisters and lived as single women in their family home their entire lives. Cassandra lost her fiancée early in her life and never married. Jane died while Cassandra was in her forties. Kathy and Carol knew that the Sister's Choice block was an ideal reflection of their lifelong love of reading, needlework and floral design.



The *Opioid Abuse Awareness* road sign was erected at the NBVFD in 2018. It is one of three signs placed within the county as part of a collaborative effort, including the Twin Beach Opioid Abuse Awareness Committee, to raise awareness of the opioid crisis in Calvert County.

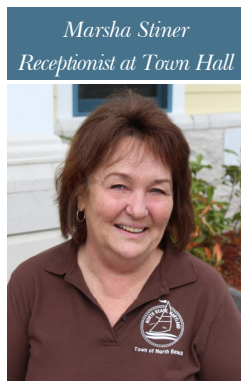
On the flip side, we've also done work to improve the

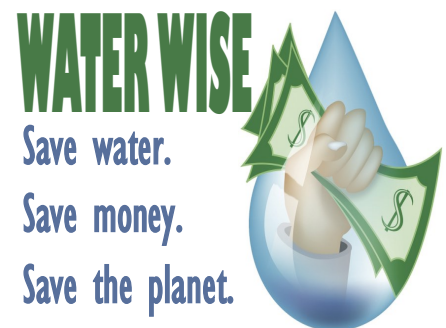

- **VIA TEXT.** In your phone, enter 30890 as the phone number you want to send a text to, and enter the words **join northbeachalerts** in the message area, then hit send.
- **ONLINE SIGNUP.** From the homepage of the town's website, click on **Subscribe to Text Notifications** and follow the steps to add contact details.
- **CALL US.** Give us a call at Town Hall and we will add you manually. We will need your cell phone number and email address if you have one.

Dog Water Station

Water bowls for dogs have always been available at the boardwalk. Unfortunately, we need to stop providing communal water bowls because they can harbor a variety of germs and be a breeding ground for bacteria, such as salmonella and e. coli, and giardia (an intestinal parasite). Water consumed from a communal bowl passes directly to

the stomach. Also, if a dog sneezes at the bowl, other dogs may be exposed to respiratory pathogens. The town has taken a proactive approach and will be providing disposable water bowls for our four-legged friends. You will notice a new dog watering station in the area of the water fountain. Help yourself to a bowl so that your dog



can have a drink and don't forget to dispose of the bowl when finished.

Healthy Living Program

The Town of North Beach became a Sustainable Community in 2017 and we wanted to further those goals by inviting our residents and surrounding county homeowners. The Healthy Living Program, which is made possible through a grant that was awarded through the Maryland Energy Administration, has been created to assist those most vulnerable, seniors and low-income residents, to take part in assisting the State of Maryland's efforts by reducing their carbon footprint. Our program reaches beyond our boundaries in North Beach, but extends to community residents that are eligible from Calvert County to apply to make their home more energy-efficient. The process is as follows:

To be eligible to apply for funding, you would have to follow the guidelines for eligibility:

1. Resident/Homeowner of Calvert County
2. Income Guidelines (According to the State of Maryland) See table.
3. Agree to have your energy bills monitored over the next three years
4. Fill out the application
5. Agree to having an Energy Audit completed before any work begins

The program will pay for any of the following eligible activities that are referred for replacement based on the Energy Audit report:

- Washer
- Refrigerator
- Stove

- Window Air Conditioner
- Central Air Conditioning
- Furnace
- Water Heater
- Weatherization
- Attic Insulation

The waiting list has begun and the applications will be available during the month of June. For additional information, please email info@northbeachmd.org.
