

Dear Neighbors,

As we enter the Fall of 2018, we have been reminded by Florence that this is the height of the hurricane season along the East Coast. The Chesapeake Bay area was spared, fortunately, from the major impact and effects of this event. Our thoughts and prayers, however, go out to those in the Carolinas who were in the path of this storm and who have experienced the consequences of serious flooding and wind damage. North Beach has been spared the full effects of a major storm since Isabel flooded the town 15 years ago and we certainly hope our good fortune continues through the end of the remaining hurricane months.

I would like to report on several developments which have occurred since the spring newsletter six months ago. First, and most importantly, the Calvert County Board of Library Trustees have determined that a new Twin Beach Library facility will be located in the Town of North Beach. This means that our residents will have a 21st Century library, in many cases, within walking distance of their homes or businesses. The Town is currently finalizing the legal agreements with the County which will enable the planning and design work to commence.

Secondly, you should know that a decades-old business location in North Beach has been recently sold. Tans, a motorcycle and (recently) automobile repair/service facility owned by Tommy Crockett for almost 50 years has been sold to Devin and Susan Shaw. Plans include significant improvements to the

exterior and interior of the building, which will continue to operate as an upgraded auto repair and service center.

Next, the Citgo station and convenience store which has stood at the corner of Chesapeake Avenue and 2nd Street for decades, will be demolished in October as part of a project to construct a new FASTOP on the site. We are advised the new facility will include numerous new features which will make the North Beach location the most modern FASTOP in the County. (See sketch Page 4).

Lastly, Neptune's, the first business you see when you enter town at 1st Street, will soon be undergoing renovations. Their plans include remodeling and adding to the existing dining room, a new kitchen, and new restrooms. These renovations will add character to the streetscape of Chesapeake Avenue. (See sketch Page 4).

In closing, I should mention this will be the final newsletter of the current administration. It has been an honor and a pleasure to serve as your mayor for most of the past 20 years. Thank you for your support and patience as the Town of North Beach has transitioned significantly since 1998. My very best wishes to the next Mayor and incoming Council.


With the record breaking rainfall and coastal flood warning events over the past several months along the East Coast, it sure has been a summer to remember (or forget)! Multiple times, our area experienced four to five inches of

the tide levels which have been as much as two feet above normal and the town had flooding in low lying areas. This is common in most of neighboring waterfront towns along the bay.

DPW spent a great amount of time dealing with all of the weatherrelated issues brought on by all of

> rainfall. this We have aggressively monitored conditions and storm water pump station activity, performed maintenance on all related equipment, and closed roads when necessary. Once each rainfall event ceased, good deal of time was spent on the required clean up. Measures have been put in place and

efforts are ongoing to minimize the flooding, but with that amount of rainfall and rise in sea level (high tides), preventing flooding is a challenge. Most of the eastern half of the country has experienced some type of flooding over the last several months.



With the leaves soon to fall, keep your gutters and downspouts clear to protect from possible water damage around your home. Clearing your yard of leaves and debris goes a long way in helping keep the storm drain collection system clear and free flowing, which is much appreciated by DPW staff.

We are hoping for a mild winter without many issues. In the next month or two, take advantage of the nicer temperatures and make sure you and your homes are prepared for winter. A few examples of how you can prepare are as follows:

- get your heating system checked out and perform preventative maintenance;
- protect water lines and crawl spaces from freezing temperatures;
- ensure your vehicle is in good running condition; and,
- test run your back-up generators if you are fortunate enough to have one available.

These are just a few examples of items things that can be addressed before winter really sets in. Please be safe and enjoy the upcoming season.

We hope you've had a chance to stop by Callis Park to see the upgrades that were made in the spring. The final phase to the park revitalization will soon begin. In this phase, the new equipment will tie into the existing playground equipment area. The new playground equipment will focus on age groups from 2 to 12 and will include play cubes, stationary buttons, moon rock climber and a unity spinner. A handicap ramp will also be installed.

In addition to the new playground equipment, security cameras will be installed for safety and monitoring park activity at night.

Funding for this project was secured by the Department of Natural Resources.





























































Town Attendants Saved Local Osprey

Town Attendants, Jessica and Lauren, were called upon by some

walkers along the boardwalk back in August who noticed a bird stranded under the pier drowning. A fisherman keeping an eye on him while everyone went to get help. Jess and Lauren quickly realized it was a local nicknamed osprey Edgar, Jr (EJ)! He was quite distressed sitting in the water. His wing was messed and he

exhausted. The waves prevented him from swimming away from the pier. After a long hour, he was able to get closer,

and the g i r l s s c o o p e d him up with a pool net. That is when they realized he was tangled in fishing line. They were able to

lift him high enough and set him free. EJ was sent to Second Chance Wildlife Sanctuary in

Gaithersburg, MD for evaluation. While at the Wildlife Sanctuary, it



was confirmed that EJ did not have a broken wing and that she was a female rather than a male! After about a week, EJ was brought back to North Beach where she was released!

Attention! The Code Enforcement Officers have begun parking enforcement in the commercial parking areas. Anyone that parks in the areas with a green-painted curb must have a hang tag that is issued by the town. If the hang tag is not clearly displayed, you will be ticketed. Please pay close attention to the parking signs.

As the fall and winter approach, I would like to remind everyone to rake and dispose of their leaves. Doing this helps keep our storm drains clear and helps reduce flooding.

As always, please be mindful of the following items:

keeping trash cans screened from public view

- . keeping grass and shrubs cut and trimmed properly
- avoiding an overaccumulation of trash, debris, or equipment
- . Keeping your vehicle tags up to date
- properly maintaining the paint and roofing on your homes
- keeping the maintenance up on fences and sheds

Museum Receives Generous Donations

Visitors always remark about the unusual artifacts that are showcased in the Museum. We would not have these items if it were not for the generosity of families who love the history of the Beaches and support us by gifting significant treasures for the public to enjoy.

Three weeks ago, Gracie, Vincent and Olivia made a trip to York Springs, Pennsylvania to pick up our newest treasure. This 1946 Bally LIDO nickel pin ball machine was originally in Ewald's Restaurant and Bar, which used to be located on the corner of Bay & 7th Street in the same building where the Post Office & Sweet Sue's exists today. When Ewald's closed in the 1960s Sammy Brandenburg purchased the pin ball machine and it's been in the Brandenburg family all these years. The Brandenburg's lived on 7th street and actually owned the site of Hook & Vine House at one time. Special 'hats off' to the Department of Public Works for getting the pinball machine safely off the truck and inside the museum.

Craig Brandenburg, pictured above, donated this pinball machine in memory and recognition of his family lovingly referred to as "COUSINS BY THE DOZENS".



This is the original Seeburg Juke Box from Uncle Billie's which was donated to the Bayside History Museum by the Sisk Family of SISK AUTO BODY, and dedicated to the memory of Ed and Ruby Lohmar. We still have visitors who remember dancing to the Juke Box when it was in Uncle Billie's. This Juke Box houses the original records that were still in it when it was taken out of Uncle Billie's.

This complete set of running gear including leather helmet and boots was donated by Joseph Fowler in memory of his grand-father, Captain Oscar Marshall, who was one of the original founders of the North Beach Volunteer Fire Department. Leather helmets first appeared in the U. S. between 1821 and 1836 and were made by a New York City luggage maker, Henry

Gratacap. The aluminum helmets were introduced in the early 1900s as an alternative to the heavier

l e a t h e r helmet. Metal helmets were lighter in weight and less expensive to make than leather, but



they had some real shortcomings. They readily conducted heat and electricity and were much more prone to bending and denting.

Tippett Jr. Director of Fire Programs for the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation, for all the historical research on helmets, boots, and running gear.
