It's hard to believe that the busy summer season has ended and the fall season is upon us. I would like to thank you all for hanging in there with us at the Friday Night Farmers' Market as we implemented changes to the layout. I assure you that the feedback we have received, both positive and negative, will be considered as we plan for the 2020 farmers' market season. I realize with the influx of guests, our town residents are impacted and challenges are presented. Your patience does not go unnoticed!

On September 20th, I had the honor of signing the Memorandum of Agreement for the construction of the new Calvert Library Twin Beaches Branch in North Beach. This is an exciting time for the town and its residents. We look forward to taking the next step.

The Maryland Department of Transportation State Highway Administration roadway reconstruction project to address periodic flooding along MD 261 from 9th Street to the Anne Arundel County line is moving forward. The design process should be completed this fall and the construction is scheduled to being the fall of 2020.

If you have had the opportunity to call Town Hall recently, you may have noticed the sounds of a new

phone system. The upgraded system is more efficient and allows the caller to press an extension to reach the desired staff member. Also recently implemented is a new Information Technology (IT) plan which includes hardware upgrades and increased network security for staff members which enables better communication with town residents. Another helpful tool on the horizon is an interactive app for zoning and code enforcement issues. This will be launched in early 2020 and you can read more information regarding this on page 6 of this newsletter.

A new initiative that I've implemented is Employee Recognition. Recently, I had the honor of recognizing two employees that have long tenure at the Town of North Beach. Mr. Isaac Harris has worked for the Department of Public Works for 30 years and Mrs. Stacy Milor has worked as Administrative Secretary and the Town Clerk for 20 years. I hope you will join me in congratulating

them on their outstanding service and commitment to the Town of North Beach.

I've recently had the opportunity to create the Stormwater and Flood Mitigation Advisory Committee (SFMAC) and to reestablish the North Beach Tree Committee. The SFMAC committee provides regarding stormwater and flood issues, while assisting with plans to improve the town's resistance to flooding. The Tree Committee is responsible for advising the town the maintenance preservation of trees and shrubs in parks, along the streets and in other public areas. The committee will also promote public awareness

and pride in our native trees, to observe Arbor Day and to move the town forward in becoming a Tree City, USA community.

In closing, I would like to remind town residents of an innovative way to follow along with Work Sessions and Town Council Meetings by utilizing BoardDocs. This paperless, cloud-based program ensures transparency of meetings and is an efficient tool to help residents stay abreast of Work Sessions and Town Council meetings without having to be physically present. the near future. Once live, you will have the ability to watch public meetings on your computer, tablet or smartphone in real time. More to come on this in the next few months!

Department of Public Works Update

The Department of Public Works (DPW) has been diligently working on upgrading the town's water system well house control building. The existing building is 30 years old with several issues in which our crew is in the process of addressing. The building currently floods often when we get heavy rains, controls are outdated and hard to replace if they fail.





This project also includes replacing the existing control panel that is located inside the DPW building. To date, a new electrical service has been installed raising service to new flood plain level. BGE has been on site to power up the new service and to cut power to the existing service. DPW has removed the old service and worked with an electrical contractor to install a new control panel and all the related conduit, wiring, etc. DPW has started the demolition of the old components.

The demolition is expected to take one week. The new well house building will be constructed on the same site as the old building. The new building will be raised two feet to protect it from flooding. New piping will be installed on the interior for better access for the daily operations and maintenance. The entire project is expected to complete by late fall.

The Department of Public Works

is also in the process of working with an outside contractor to complete water meter replacement project. This project consists updating over 760 water meters within the town's water system to new "radio read" type meters. This update will allow staff to more efficiently track water usage for billing purposes MDE reporting requirements.

Mayor Benton has formed a new stormwater

and flood mitigation committee, which includes town staff members and residents of North Beach. The mission, in general, is to provide new ideas and possible solutions to stormwater and flooding-related issues throughout town. To date, the committee has held two productive meetings where they have discussed ideas that may serve as improvements to the town's flooding issues. The meetings are held the third Monday of each month at 3 pm at

the DPW building.

Fall means beautiful foliage, but with this comes falling leaves. Please bag or haul away all leaves and yard debris. We are asking you, as a town resident, to do your part in keeping the leaves off the streets and out of the storm drain collection system. This will ensure proper water flow and will prevent the need for difficult and costly removal of this material from the drains. We ask that you bag the leaves you collect in paper leaf bags and set them out with your regular trash. The trash contractor will collect trash first. If there are more than 5 bags, the contractor will have to get them at a later time.

Hello, my friends!



Census Takers in Your Neighborhood



Census Takers in y o u r neighborhood is a

normal part of preparations for the 2020 Census.

How Can You Verify That Someone Is a Census Worker?

If someone visits your home to collect information for the 2020 Census, you can do the following to verify their identity:

- Make sure that they have a valid ID badge, with their photograph, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark, and an expiration date.
- If you still have questions about their identity, you can call 800-923-8282 to speak with a Census Bureau representative.

Why Are Census Workers Out in Communities?

You might see census takers in your neighborhood for a few different reasons:

- Verifying addresses in preparation for the census.
- Collecting responses to the census or another survey.
- Dropping off census materials.
- Conducting quality checks related to the census.

Census takers who verify addresses are called address canvassers. They help ensure an accurate and complete count by verifying addresses and noting where houses, apartments, shelters, and other residences are located. Census takers will attempt

to knock on every door in the neighborhood they are canvassing. In May 2020, census takers begin visiting homes that haven't responded to the 2020 Census to help ensure everyone is counted. At the same time, other Census Bureau representatives will be visiting homes for ongoing surveys, such as the American Community Survey.

Be Proactive

By April 1, 2020, all homes will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census. The best way to avoid a follow-up visit from a census taker is to fill out the 2020 Census questionnaire online, by phone, or by mail as soon as you receive your invitation to participate.

Citizen Mobile Access

North Beach will be launching a new interactive Citizen Mobile App in early 2020. With this app, residents will be able to use their smartphones or other digital devices by quickly and easily communicating with the appropriate department.

This app will allow residents to report issues or concerns in real time, as they see them. The app will give residents the ability to, point, click, and submit feedback. Photos and notes can be submitted with each case. These requests are automatically entered into a new case management

system which will streamline the process in an effort to shorten the time in which issues are addressed. This app will improve communication and residents will be more involved and better informed.

Community Conservation Takes Off

The Department of Community Conservation provides "green" sustainability programs for residents, as well as eco-tourism opportunities within town. The department promotes restoration of native wildlife habitats and the living shoreline, maintains safe surroundings at the town parks and natural areas, and creates outdoor recreation and natural history community outreach events.

After a busy summer of programs, we are gearing up for North Beach's first ever Fall Birding Weekend. The weekend kicks off with an Owl Prowl Night Hike on Saturday, October 12th at 7 pm. Come to Wetlands Overlook Park wearing your walking shoes, dressed for the weather. This walk into the woodland trail will introduce us to the three species of owls that may call North Beach home.

Back at Wetlands Overlook Park on Sunday, October 13th from 7 am to 3 pm, help our Bird Count Circle compete in The Big Sit! Every year, bird watchers from

around the globe unite on this special day by participating in this free event. Often referred to as a "tailgate party for

birders," the objective of this nationwide bird-a-thon is to tally as many bird species as can be seen or heard while in the circle. Bring your cooler, chairs, binoculars, scopes and snacks — the beautiful setting at Wetlands Overlook Park will provide the birds! The day concludes with a "Tally Rally" dinner at Hook & Vine at 5 pm.

Over the summer, you may have noticed representatives from the Maryland Department of Natural

> Resources, Forestry Division in town. They we re conducting an inventory of the trees

on town property, evaluating their health and determining an overall tree canopy within the town.

In recognition of the town's Centennial in the year 2000, the North Beach Tree Committee designated twelve large trees as Centennial Trees. We are happy to report that all twelve of the Centennial Trees still stand, although one will be removed due to disease. Along with the Environmental Committee and the Community Conservation Department, the reestablished North Beach Tree Committee will work to create new signage and rededicate the remaining trees.

On May 5, 1900 Philip Chew, Richard Chew, Allen Mallery, E. Judge Williams and Richard Knight formed the North Chesapeake Beach Land Improvement Company for the express purpose of buying, selling and mortgaging land for a resort they named North Chesapeake Beach (today North Beach). In 1902, waterfront lots cost \$300 each (\$25 up front and \$10/month thereafter). When North Beach was incorporated in 1910 the prices of lots rose to \$450 each.

One of the early uses of the Calvert Hotel was that of a real estate office. Ads were run in Washington, D. C. stating that "North (Chesapeake) Beach has a reputation for a high-class, home city where living expenses were for the Grocer and not the Doctor."



The Calvert Hotel was owned by Earl and Marie Kosche in the 1960's. There was a restaurant and bar on the first floor and live entertainment was provided.

Ray Petrie and his family were the last owners of the Calvert Hotel. Ironically, it was the last of the great hotels in North Beach. Sunrise Garden now exists on the site where the Calvert Hotel used to be.

Check out the photo number for the Miramar Hotel. For those of



us who grew up in the Beach area, our initial phone service started out as party-lines. Dale Thomas, owner of Nice and Fleazy, relocated his antique business from Owings to the bottom of the Miramar Hotel before it closed. Visitors could rent a room at the Miramar, eat at Franchi's Restaurant next door or at the Miramar Hotel restaurant and shop for antiques.



There were so many boarding houses, hotels and motels to accommodate all the visitors. Today, the site where the Little Wanderer Hotel was located is the vacant lot on the corner of 3rd Street and Dayton Avenue.



Another beautiful grand hotel was the North Beach Hotel which was located on the corner of Chesapeake Avenue and 2nd Street where the gas station exists today.



The Pines and Holly Boarding house was operated by Mrs. Kerns. It was located between 2nd and 3rd Streets on Bay Avenue.

These are just a few of the hotels, motels, boarding houses and camps that were located in town. Most of the earliest ads for North Beach lauded the resort's natural setting as an escape from the rigors and weariness of the city. One such ad talked of bathing, crabbing, fishing, sailing, rowing, motor boat riding, horseback riding and strolling among the oaks and pines. Many vacationers took to picnicking and hunting, with several hunting clubs building lodges in the resort. Oxcart rides were very popular.

North Beach's reputation as a family-friendly resort, and its accessibility from Washington, D.C. encouraged thousands of vacationers to patronize the local arcades, restaurants and beach on summer day trips. A newspaper account from June 23, 1941, reported that the summer season started off exceptionally well with 20,000 bathers reported to have hit the beach, a season record for the town.
